DIRECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Welcome to our 2014 annual newsletter. I would like to start by saying thank you for your support and interest in the work of GenR8; it is very much appreciated.

When GenR8 first started one of our main aims was to give children a positive image of the Christian faith, to counteract the many negative images and stereotypes around. More than 10 years on it's great to receive comments and stories of how our work has done just that! Only last week a teenager remarked, "I just wanted to say how much GenR8 meant to me". Over the years we have been blown away by meeting teenagers who speak positively about our visits to their schools. Many, if not most, of these are 'not yet' Christians, but the door to faith is definitely open. I suspect the impact of GenR8 is much greater than we will ever know. Here is part of one teenager's story which emphasises the effect we can have:

"I was eight years old when GenR8 first came to my school. My friend and I so enjoyed their assemblies that we signed up to the Xcellr8 weekend. This was lots of fun but challenged me to think about living for Jesus back at school". From here this person volunteered for GenR8 in several ways: It's Your Move, Xcellr8 and work experience. She goes on to say, "The work of GenR8 challenged me to go deeper in my faith and then enabled me to share this with others. GenR8 has been central to my Christian discipleship".

At GenR8's core are volunteers. Over the past year more than 70 people have volunteered for one or more GenR8 related activities, which is fantastic. We are so grateful for the time, energy and skill that people bring to different aspects of our work. However we are always on the look-out for new volunteers. In fact at the time of writing we have a particular need for more volunteers for our assembly teams. With this in mind we have included a flier and news sheet articles for circulation which we hope you will use to advertise our need within your church. As one volunteer said "It was exciting to be part of children's journey in finding out more about our God."

GenR8 PRESENTATIONS IN 2013

Our Easter presentation was called "What a Friend". We illustrated the story of Good Friday using a piece of paper torn into the three crosses, a spear and dice. The resurrection was retold in sketch form from the viewpoint of the disciples and Mary, who discovered the empty tomb and were then visited by Jesus. The assembly ended with a moving poem summarising the whole story of Easter: "Not just that Jesus died, But that He's alive forever, And is always by our side".

In the summer term we learnt about "God's Big Family", exploring the growth of the global church from Pentecost to the present day. We sang "Jesus never, never, never turned anyone away" because Jesus invited everyone to be part of God's family. We encouraged the children to follow Jesus' example by caring for others.



At Christmas we talked about the "Special Gift" of Jesus to the whole world. The puppets discovered that the story of the first Christmas and the greatest Christmas gift of all is found in the Bible. Our mime showed that often people are too busy or distracted to accept this gift that God offers them. However, the shepherds and the wise men gave their time to visit Jesus and worship him.

XCELLR8 WEEKEND



"Is it a bird?... Is it a plane?... No it's the roar of Xcellr8 2013! The "Junior Hero" themed weekend was a brilliant success, looking at the stories of Miriam, Samuel, David and the servant girl Rhoda, and teaching the children to trust in God and listen to him. The Wide Game proved an especially super hit with the young people – seeing them flying into action outdoors. Other highlights included: small groups in which we made our own superhero masks, swimming, John Hardwick and Charlie the Monkey, watching The Incredibles and even a bit of

Danger Mouse. Ultimately, Xcellr8 2013 taught us that no matter what our age or size, we can do anything if we trust in God! Bring on Xcellr8 2014! *Andy Staplehurst*.

Xcellr8 is a residential weekend for 8-11 year olds held annually in February.

PRAISE PARTY

On Saturday 8th June Ely Cathedral hosted the Praise Party – "Go Global". Over 200 children with their families enjoyed an afternoon of fun led by singer and writer, John Hardwick. Through songs, drama, games and quizzes, the children learnt that God's family grew and grew through the work of the Holy Spirit and by sharing God's love. The "Shout Aloud' children's choir led the "Go Global" song and performed "When you believe" from the Prince of Egypt.

INSPIRE PRAYER SPACES

INSPIRE prayer spaces use imaginative and hands-on activities for pupils to explore spirituality, values and emotions in fresh, creative ways. They are designed as a resource for local churches to use in their relationship with schools. Feedback from the ten primary schools we visited during 2013 was very positive, so much so that we are working towards return visits! COOL CHOICES

Our *Cool Choices* initiative was launched during 2013 and by the time of writing will have visited nine primary schools. *Cool Choices* uses a variety of interactive activities to help year 5 and 6 students identify the choices they face now and in the future. The programme encourages students to think through the influences and pressures on them, with the aim that they will make positive life choices. OTHER ACTIVITIES

It's Your Move Plus visited 11 schools last July to help children in their move to secondary school. A team of 10 young people enthusiastically shared their advice and gave reassurance to Year 6 pupils across the county. Three Bitesize Train up evenings in September and October were well attended and had great feedback. They dealt with a range of issues such as involving the whole church in children's ministry to handling difficult behaviour. Steve Whyatt has continued as Chaplain at Oakington Primary School one day a week, offering pastoral care to members of the school community. This year GenR8 visited



five churches with an **All-age service**; themes included friendship, choices and forgiveness.

MEET THE TEAM MEMBER: Lesley van der Walle

I was born in Paisley and moved to Bottisham with my family – husband Chris and children, Hazel and Ross – at the end of June 2012.



I had been a volunteer with Scripture Union (SU), involved in lunchtime groups in primary schools and termly "Megamix" events, as well as working in children's ministry in Hamilton Baptist Church.

We are now members of RE:NEW, a small ecumenical church which meets in Bottisham. I contacted the SU East Region Team when we moved to see how I could get involved and everyone seemed to mention GenR8, and put me in touch with Steve Whyatt. I saw the South team "in action" in December 2012 and attended GenR8 induction training in January 2013. I work part-time as a hospital pharmacist and have arranged my hours so that I can commit up to two days a week to GenR8. I went on my first tour with the Central team in Summer 2013.

I love being part of GenR8: it is a real encouragement to me. Being part of a small church, it has been great meeting with other Christians to share and support each other. We all have a common heart to present the Christian message to children and it is a privilege to be welcomed into schools. It is such a blessing to be part of GenR8 and I pray that we will be a blessing to others.

GenR8 FINANCES

Towards the end of last year GenR8 delivered its third annual report and accounts to the Charities Commission. The trustees were again encouraged by the level of income: £78k (2012: £74k) of which grants received amounted to £39k (2012: £37k). Donations from our supporter network and schools rose to £35k (2012: £33k) and the balance of the income came from resources and events. Total expenditure in 2013 was £55k (2012: £54k). As expected this was primarily staff-related costs of £42k (2012: £41k).

As reported previously the grant from Scripture Union finishes in April 2014 and we will need to be self-financing thereafter. We are grateful to SU for their support in launching GenR8 and to our regular supporters for their continued generosity.

A VIEW FROM A TRUSTEE
