

## Peer Pressure 2017

This term we have approached our support materials a little differently. The theme is 'peer pressure'. Making the right choices and doing the right thing can be explored across the whole curriculum. We have mapped out some ways in which exploring these themes could support spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.

Spiritual	Moral
SpiritualExploring self-worth perhaps through assemblies, PSHE or circle time. Link back to the GenR8 presentation.Encourage the children to ask questions about the two biblical narratives (Daniel and his friends, and the Good Samaritan). Consider how different people may have responded in these situations.Create a series of prayer spaces linked to making right choices and doing the right thing. Use summer term visits/trips to promote the idea of making the right choices, particularly regarding how children spend their time at weekends and during the summer holiday break.	Why not undertake an RE learning enquiry about the Christian concept of 'loving your neighbour' e.g. <u>http://www.rewithsoul.co.uk/primary-ks2-</u> <u>2/unit-1-love-neighbour/</u>
On Sports Day encourage the children to be 'good losers' and support one another. Using peer mediators and the restorative approach supports making the right choices. Use approaches to teaching and learning such as 'community of enquiry' or Philosophy for Children to encourage pupils to explain their points of views with reasons and listen to others. Explore cultural and religious traditions relating to food. Children might consider how schools can ensure that all diets are catered for. Look at other examples of people who have stood up for their beliefs and done the right thing e.g. Martin Luther King, Gandhi.

## **COOL CHOICES**

You may be interested in GenR8's Cool Choices initiative for year 6 students.

Cool Choices is a 2hr interactive session aimed at year 6 students to help them make positive life choices. The initiative uses a variety of ideas, fun and interaction to encourage students to think through areas such as: What are choices? – We make hundreds each day! Who influences our choices? – Parents, peers, media?

What are uncool and cool choices? – *How can we know what are good and bad choices?* What are the barriers to making cool choices?

Cool Choices includes a reflective response time and a Christian perspective on making 'cool' choices. Cool Choices fits well within the PSHE scheme of work. (*i.e. managing risk*)
